Why is Scotland so different?

- Housing is devolved to the Scottish Parliament
- Since the Introduction of HMO Licensing in 1999, there have been increasing moves to regulate the PRS in Scotland
- Scottish Government and the Scottish Parliament are very keen to see a well functioning sector and sets out a plan to achieve this ...



The Scottish Government has a plan!

Households in Scotland

Figures from 2016 indicate:

- 2.45 million households in Scotland
- **≥** 370,000 households in the PRS
 - 41% of adults at their address for under 1 year
 - 62% of households contain 1 or 2 adults under 65 yrs with NO children
 - **№** 67% of properties are flats
 - 34% of tenants are aged 25-34 yrs

Households in Scotland by Tenure

Figures from 2016 indicate:

- **≥** 61% Owner Occupier
- **23% Social Rented**
- 15% Private rented (estimated 208% increase in absolute households since 1999)
 - **≥** 83% of people live in urban areas
 - 17% of people live in rural areas
- 1% Other



Landlords and Properties in the PRS

Figures from 2016 indicate:

- 70% of landlords own only one property, 95% own 1-5 properties, 5% of landlords own 40% of the PRS
- Properties in the PRS:
 - **2** 84% owned by individual landlords, couple or family
 - 14% owned by a company, partnership or property trust
 - 2% owned by an institution



Who lives in the PRS in Scotland?

- Families with children in the PRS increased from 20% in 1999 to 27% in 2011
- Estimated 72,000 households in the PRS have children
- 13% of young people (16-34yrs) lived in the PRS in 1999.
- Estimated that by 2020 37% of young people will live in the PRS!

- Antisocial Behaviour etc (Scotland) Act 2004

 Introduced compulsory registration of landlords
- Housing (Scotland) Act 2006
 Introduced the Repairing Standard
- **■** Private Housing (Tenancies) (Scotland) Act 2016

 - Evictions
 - Repairs
 - Complaints about Letting Agents & Property Factors
